In celebration of that, they will occasionally still show the erotic movie. It is the only type of movie that has the age restriction (15 years old).







Hearing music performed in public brings me joy. I love the moment when I first hear a note, and my mind starts to process the music. What song is being played? What genre? Then, I ask myself: Do I know the song?

I am often captivated by music played in public such that the only thing that feels natural is to take a moment to acknowledge that someone has taken time from their day to perform in front of others – to make a melody that wasn't there before.

Walking past the Mozart Opera House in Vienna, I saw an orchestra walk out onto a balcony, dressed in the most elegant of white tie attire – proper clothes for performing. Then, starting with a trumpet, instruments progressively joined, orchestrated by the conductor who was standing on street level.

I was immersed in the beauty of the music, the precision of the sounds – from pianissimo to the inevitable crescendo – and hoped that they would perform all day.

One song was performed; one delightful, magical song. Then, the orchestra went away for the day. I wonder: was this a one-off event? Had the orchestra been planning to play from the balcony and be conducted from the street for a long time? Or is it a daily occurrence? Perhaps a way to bring music to the people in a place – the opera – that is historically associated with exclusivity.

Whatever the reason and the context, I know one thing: that day, the musicians brought joy to the streets of Vienna, and left a memory that makes me smile each time I recall my journeys to the city. Vienna truly is the city of music.
